LOCAL AUTHOR CAPTIVATES CHILDREN WITH INTERACTIVE NEW BOOK

Local author Kathryn Madeline Allen recently released her new children's book, *A Kiss Means I Love You*, published by Albert Whitman & Company. Allen said the inspiration for the book came from her first son.

"When he was a baby, I wanted to write a book about the things that happen in the course of a baby's day," Allen said. "I didn't get around to writing it until many years later. It started out with facial expressions and gestures that a baby or young child would encounter, and then evolved into a book about children and the nonverbal communication they encounter each day."

The end product is an interactive book that encourages babies and children to explore common expressions and gestures, such as waving, smiling and laughing, as well as some sounds, such as roaring. The child shares these activities with the adult who's reading the book aloud.

The book's photographer, Eric Futran, captured beautiful photos of a diverse range of babies and toddlers, printed in full color.

At a recent book signing, Allen had the opportunity to watch a child acting out different characters as her mother read the book to her. The idea is to get children excited about the pictures of the babies, even if they are too young to read. In fact, Allen recommends reading to children as early and frequently as possible—even starting when they are babies.

"Reading to children, starting at a young age, is so important," Allen said. "It helps with the development of language, it fosters a love of reading, and it helps them become better students later in life."

> Allen also encourages parents to take their children to the library. "We have some great libraries in the Detroit area with wonderful,

lively children's sections. Many of them have been renovated recently, and they often invite authors in to have story time," Allen said, adding that children should be encouraged to check out lots of books.

In Allen's case, she said she was always encouraged by her parents to write and be creative. Her sixth grade teacher chose her to participate in a young writers' conference at Oakland University, which helped her realize she wanted to be a writer someday.

One other important lesson her parents stressed was manners, and that, too, shaped Allen's future. One of her previous books, *This Little Piggy's Book of Manners*, is about the importance of good manners. It is targeted towards ages 2-6 and features collage illustrations by Nancy Wolff. She is currently working on another book for children about table manners. When not working on children's books, Allen teaches professional communication and children's literature at Oakland Community College. Some of her favorite children's books include classics such as *Goodnight Moon* because of its illustrations and quiet tone.

"I also love the Madeline series," Allen said. "I always liked that she was brave and she lived with other girls in France." Allen also includes Illustrator Jerry Pinkney, whose work was recently featured at the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History in Detroit, in her list of favorites. Books by Paul Fleischman and Michigan author, Christopher Paul Curtis, top her list too.
